Moreover, the author explores what he calls the "dharmic double helix" of Brahmanism, most explicitly articulated by the structural opposition between pravṛtti (worldly) and nivṛtti (other-worldly) dharmas. As the first narrative study of the Sūrya Māhātmya, along with the first study of the *Mārkaṇḍeya Purāṇa* (or any *Purāṇa*), as a narrative whole, this book will be of interest to academics in the field of Religion, Hindu Studies, South Asian Studies,

Goddess Studies, Narrative Theory and Comparative Mythology.
