Undergraduates (N=75) were randomly assigned to three groups: no summary, immediate summary and delayed summary. After screening data to remove participants who did not apply plausible effort, no statistically detectable differences were found for test performance across groups nor was transfer of the hypothesized effect observed. I conclude there is need to consider difficulties of reading texts and tests, and learners' metacomprehension skills to achieve a high level of metacomprehension accuracy and affect studying productively.
